WHY SUPPORT laH?

IaH provides access to internationally positioned learning experiences and allows all students to learn and benefit from the rich diversity of our global community. It's not only accessible to the smaller percentage of students who are able to study or work abroad. IaH not only enhances students' academic studies, it also supports inclusivity, employability, sustainability and develops intercultural competencies.

- Use of diversity within the classroom

- Skills for working globally eg language, intercultural and digital skills
- Collaborative Online International Learning (COIL)
- Internationalised learning outcomes:
- Demonstrate knowledge of subject areas in a global context
- Identify cultural influences and factors
- Demonstrate intercultural awareness
- Evidence collaboration across borders

THE INFORMAL CURRICULUM

Co-curricular international experiences providing intercultural learning opportunities.

THE HIDDEN CURRICULUM

Expectations, assumptions and norms which can play a significant role in shaping experiences in the learning environment.

- Examples of IaH in the Hidden Curriculum:
 - Strategy, values, beliefs and behaviours
 - Internationalisation/inclusivity practices and policies
 - Academic culture, curricula choice and delivery



- Services, facilities, systems and procedures
- Induction and onboarding
- Sharing of staff and student experience
- Influence, perspective and awareness
